## Limitations of the Study

- I. Active parent consent severely limits the number of youth data instruments and the age of youth surveyed.
- 2. Most of youth data instruments are deficit based and do not track precisely targeted Youth Development outcomes
- 3. Limited pool of comparison cities and comparison YRBS local data.

## A Quick Summary of the Results

- I. Anchorage youth started with higher levels of risk behaviors.
- 2. Nationwide, youth risk behaviors have decreased during the past 18 years.
- 3. Anchorage youth improved faster than the national average on most items.
- 4. Anchorage youth are currently above the national average on 1/2 of the items.
- 5. Anchorage youth are worse than the national average on no items.

















### SCCS: Connection to School





#### SCCS: Peer Climate





## SCCS: Community Support




